Founded in 1997, TNTP was created on the belief that all students deserve access to excellent teaching and educational opportunity. Over nearly three decades, the organization has grown from solely focusing on recruiting and training excellent teachers to a broader mission of providing all young people with the access and capability they need to thrive in life. Along the way, TNTP has shaped national and local education policy and practice through influential research, including *The Widget Effect*, *The Opportunity Myth*, and *Accelerate, Don't Remediate*.

Dr. Tequilla Brownie is Chief Executive Officer of TNTP, a national education nonprofit driving large-scale change across school systems and communities in 39 states and territories. A former school social worker and licensed therapist, Dr. Brownie built her career as a district leader in Memphis City Schools before rising to lead one of the country's most influential education organizations. Her path — from rural Arkansas to Yale to the CEO's office — shapes her conviction that unlocking mobility at scale requires both strong academic foundations as well as the development of real capability.

Dr. Brownie has appeared in such major publications as The New York Times, The Washington Post, and USA TODAY, as well as on CNN. She has also spoken on prominent national stages, including at the ASU+GSV Summit, to the National Governors Association, and as a TED Talk presenter where she was recognized as a TEDx Editor's Pick of 2024. Under her leadership, TNTP works to build a future where every young person can thrive—by creating coherent instruction, connecting education to careers, and leveraging AI responsibly to give students the skills and opportunities they need to shape their own futures. Dr. Brownie holds degrees from Yale, the University of Tennessee–Knoxville, and the University of Memphis. She is a Presidential Leadership Scholar, Pahara Fellow, and ASU+GSV Power of Women winner.

FAQs

What is TNTP's official name?

Formerly known as The New Teacher Project, the organization rebranded to TNTP in 2011 to better reflect the breadth of our work.

What is TNTP?

TNTP is a national nonprofit that partners with school districts, state education agencies, and other education and community leaders to improve student outcomes. Through consulting, research, and implementation support, TNTP helps education systems strengthen teaching and learning, develop effective educators and leaders, and create more opportunities that prepare all young people for meaningful work and meaningful lives.

What are TNTP's primary areas of focus?

TNTP helps education systems improve student outcomes through work in teaching and learning, educator effectiveness, leadership development, talent strategy, organizational effectiveness, education policy, and pathways that prepare students for success after high school.

Who does TNTP work with?

TNTP works with school districts, state education agencies, charter school networks, community organizations, foundations, workforce, municipal/ state government leaders and policymakers across the country. We partner with leaders who are committed to improving outcomes and expanding opportunities for young people.

What makes TNTP different from other education organizations?

TNTP combines deep expertise with practical experience. Our team includes former educators, school and district leaders, policymakers, and researchers who understand the realities schools face. We don't just study problems; we work side-by-side with leaders to implement solutions that drive measurable results for students. We work at the intersection of research, policy, and practice, and our work in each area informs the others.

What long-term change is TNTP working to create?

TNTP is working toward a future where every young person, regardless of background, has access to excellent teaching, meaningful learning experiences, and pathways that prepare them to thrive in school, career, and life. We partner with education systems to help students develop the knowledge and skills they need for meaningful work and meaningful lives.

Case Studies

A Coherent Approach to Early Literacy in Rural Missouri

Strengthening the Early Literacy Workforce.

The Missouri Rural Schools Early Literacy Collaborative includes two interconnected work streams that together create coherence across the full ecosystem of early literacy instruction. First, to strengthen the state's pipeline for literacy coaches, TNTP is partnering with a local university to develop an early literacy coaching certificate aligned to state requirements and the science of reading. Second, TNTP directly coaches 50 K–1 teachers while simultaneously building the capacity of school administrators to sustain and scale the work over years to come.

Early Results: Dramatic Gains in K–1 Literacy.

After the first year of coaching support in kindergarten and first grade, the growth in these Missouri schools was striking. In Dent-Phelps R–3 Schools in Salem, the percentage of first graders reading at grade level soared from 25.5 percent to 89.4 percent between fall and spring in the 2024–25 school year. In Newburg Elementary School, 100 percent of kindergarten and first grade students demonstrated growth on reading assessments, making gains that, on average, doubled typical annual growth rates. As a result of this aligned approach—linking preparation, practice, and leadership—the state has asked TNTP to replicate the coaching model across 60 schools.
